NSPCC Online Safety Help

The NSPCC came into school the week before half term and did a great assembly with the children all about keeping themselves safe. Following this we sent home a pack they had given us for children and parents to work through and hopefully get a little sponsorship for.

While they were here they told us about a new service they have just set up with the phone company O2. This service is about giving advice and support to parents around online safety.

With children accessing online material at a younger age it is important for us as parents to be confident we are doing everything possible to ensure they do not access by accident any inappropriate material.

The service the NSPCC has set up can help parents with things like setting up parental controls on computers and other devices, adjusting privacy settings, social networks and gaming. You do not need to be an O2 customer to access the advice it is free to anyone.

Class Dojo



Class Dojo is the system we use in school to reward positive behaviour. It is a computer based program that the teachers put up on the whiteboard in the classrooms every day. It looks like a screen full of friendly monsters, with green numbers next to them.

The idea of Class Dojo is to reward children when they show one of the eight learning behaviours we focus on in school. The children get one point each time they show one of these behaviours or show good manners. These points add together for the individual child and combine to give a whole class score. The class with the highest number of points wins a special trophy in Celebration Assembly every Friday.

Each week we reset the points in the class to zero so that every week becomes a chance to show what a great learner you are.

Ask your child if they got any points today and if so what they got them for.
